BBQ Chicken Sliders Recipe

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 25 min. + brining Cook: 4 hours

MAKES: 8 servings

Ingredients

BRINE:

1-1/2 quarts water

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

2 tablespoons salt

1 tablespoon liquid smoke

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

CHICKEN:

2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breast halves

1/3 cup liquid smoke

1-1/2 cups hickory smoke-flavored barbecue sauce

16 slider buns or dinner rolls, split and warmed

Directions

In a large bowl, mix brine ingredients, stirring to dissolve brown sugar. Reserve 1 cup brine for cooking chicken; cover and refrigerate.

Place chicken in a large resealable bag; add remaining brine. Seal bag, pressing out as much air as possible; turn to coat chicken. Place in a large bowl; refrigerate 18-24 hours, turning occasionally.

Remove chicken from brine and transfer to a 3-qt. slow cooker; discard brine in bag. Add reserved 1 cup brine and 1/3 cup liquid smoke to chicken. Cook, covered, on low 4-5 hours or until chicken is tender.

Remove chicken; cool slightly. Discard cooking juices. Shred chicken with two forks and return to slow cooker. Stir in barbecue sauce; heat through. Serve on buns. Yield: 8 servings (2 sliders each).



Delaware Fishing Report

Updated: June 9, 2016

DELAWARE BAY We had a reasonably good weather weekend, but then a cold front dropped down on Tuesday and the wind blew a gale out of the northwest on Wednesday and Thursday. This northwest wind dropped the water temperature at Lewes by five degrees. This type of sudden temperature drop can shock most fish and put them off their feed for several days.

Keeper-sized rockfish are still being caught in the Upper Bay. The overall size has gone down and I didn't hear of any citation-sized fish, but there are enough 28-inch and above rock out there to fill the two-fish limit. Cut bunker is still the top bait with bloodworms and peeler crab following close behind. Augustine Beach and the Augustine Wall were two of the better locations along with the always popular Yellow Can and 6L Buoy.

It doesn't seem to matter the time of year or weather conditions, white perch fishing is usually pretty good. Soaking bloodworms or earthworms either from shore along the Upper Bay and Lower Delaware River or any one of the tidal creeks and rivers will produce some action. Right now, perch to over one-pound are being caught on a regular basis. Big catfish and small rockfish are mixed in with the perch. The rock will take the same baits as the perch while the cats don't have a restricted diet and will take just about anything they can find.

Black drum are still on the Coral Beds. Fish to 70 pounds have been caught and I believe the action will continue to improve as the moon fills. Clams are the most popular bait with live hard crabs and peelers also finding fans. Hard crabs will deter the sharks, rays and skates for a more enjoyable drum fishing experience.

Big blues are in the Lower Bay and up the Broadkill River as far as Steamboat Landing. Cut bunker has been the top bait, but those casting metal lures or bucktails are also finding action. The Cape Henlopen Fishing Pier has seen blues to over ten pounds and boaters operating between the Pier and the Inner Wall have also connected with a few choppers.

Croaker, kings and small trout are available at the Coral Beds, Broadkill Beach and the Broadkill River. Bloodworms or small bits of clam will catch all three species. Right now the kings and croaker are small but larger fish will arrive as the water warms.

Small blues were reported from shore at Bowers Beach. Cut bunker is the top bluefish bait.

INSHORE OCEAN So far this year we have recorded two huge thresher sharks. The first weighed in at 297 pounds and was caught at B Buoy. The second was a real monster, weighing 477 pounds and caught at A Buoy. This fishery should be good for at least another two weeks.

Sea bass action has moved well offshore with the Del-Jersey-Land Reef about the closet site with at least a few keepers still around. We heard of one angler who caught a six-pound sea bass here last week. The boats doing best with the bass are those whose captains have a black book full of secret snags, wrecks and hard bottom. Clam or squid will attract sea bass.

A few more flounder were caught at B Buoy, A Buoy and the Old Grounds. This area was the hot flounder spot for the past few years and it looks like it is going to be pretty good again this season. Live minnows with a strip of squid is always a good choice for flounder.

INDIAN RIVER INLET The rockfish bite is best after dark with black plugs, bucktails or swim shads the top lures. Incoming water has been the best time to try your luck.

Bluefish arrive on incoming water during the day. A white bucktail with a white plastic worm or a metal lure will draw strikes from the blues.

I wish I had better news on the flounder bite, but so far this spring it just isn't happening. A few fish have been caught out of Massey's Ditch and the VFW Slough with the emphasis on a few. We are expecting a run of warm, dry weather so maybe that will get the flounder in a feeding mood.

SURF FISHING Big rockfish and blues are still scattered up and down the beach from Herring Point to Fenwick Island. Cut bunker has been the universal bait with some of the rock caught on sand fleas and clam.

Kings have been taken on bloodworms. These tasty little fish can make for a productive day at the beach.



Before you Fish

Before you go fishing, crabbing, or clamming in Delaware you must:

Purchase a 2016 Delaware fishing license and keep it with you while fishing. Get a free 2016 FIN number (automatically generated with the purchase of an individual license) and keep it with you while fishing.

If fishing for freshwater trout get a 2016 trout stamp and affix it to your license.

While fishing, crabbing, or clamming in Delaware, you must:

Abide by size and possession limits.

Be aware of area and seasonal closures.

Please be aware that:

Delaware does not have fishing license reciprocity with other states. You must have a Delaware fishing license to fish, crab or clam in Delaware.

Delaware does not recognize Federal FIN numbers or FIN numbers from other states.

You must have a free Delaware FIN

You must have a New Jersey FIN number if you fish in New Jersey waters of Delaware Bay.

Non-resident – Any non-resident who is 16 years of age or older except persons covered by one of the exemptions is required to have a license to fish, clam, or crab in the waters of the State of Delaware. Non-residents may purchase a 7-consecutive day tourist fishing license.

Patriotic Baton Craft for Kids

How to Make It

- Eight to ten **sheets** of newspaper (for each baton)
 - Transparent tape
 - Scissors
 - Red ribbon
 - Crafts glue
 - Shredded crinkle paper
 - 5-inch silver cardboard star
 - Star-shape foam stickers

1. Tightly roll a stack eight to ten sheets of newspaper (roll from one corner on a diagonal) and secure with tape. Trim to about 20 inches long.
2. Tape the red ribbon at one end of the stick and wrap it in a spiral to the other end; secure with tape.
3. Glue crinkle paper and a silver cardboard star on to one end of the baton; let dry flat.
4. Adhere star-shape foam stickers to the cardboard star.
